The Budget Breakdown


July 1 means more to your City than the halfway point in the year, it also signifies the start of a new fiscal year. The City's annual budget is drafted, proposed and approved over the course of about six months. While time-consuming, this critical task keeps the city running smoothly, selects projects to tackle, and addresses priorities to better meet the needs of our residents and businesses.

As early as January, department heads and division managers, staff and myself work to assess our needs, prioritize public requests, and discuss expenditures for the coming year's budget. As a City, we pledge to operate transparently, and I lay it all out each year in our draft budget. Here, I will also try to give a snapshot version. Where does the money come from? Where does it go? How are we held accountable?

Governmental entities use the concept of "fund accounting" as a way to record and recognize financial transactions. In this application "funds" are defined as self-balancing sets of accounts based on the fund purpose and the primary revenue source of that fund.

For fiscal year 2021-2022 the City will utilize seven funds, each with a different purpose: General, Capital Improvements, Water, Sewer, and Solid Waste Collection Utilities, an insurance internal service fund, and a fund to record redevelopment activities. These funds all have dedicated, or primary, revenue sources. Those revenue sources finance various services that are provided to the residents and businesses.

A Quick Summary of City Funds

The largest piece of the pie (64%), the **General Fund** (GF), primarily comes from property taxes, sales taxes and other government fees, grants and revenues. The GF covers a vast number of critical things. Including many City services that residents will recognize, such as: law enforcement, fire and ambulance services, road repairs and maintenance, planning, zoning, engineering, animal services, parks, recreation, and administration are all financed in the GF. Also, the grant revenue that finances Promise SSL is recorded in the GF. The GF affords the cost of our current and new city employees, it funds the city justice court, clerks and attorneys. It is for the preservation of green spaces, our streams, parks and playgrounds, and for building and repairing roads and sidewalks. This year, it will provide the means to create a Civilian Review Board.

Our **Capital Improvement Fund** (14%), is also derived from taxes. Certain large building, equipment, road, and infrastructure expenditures, which support and enhance the services financed in the General Fund, are recorded here. In 2021, the City has plans to remodel the Columbus Center into a new community space, renovate the Fitts Park playgrounds and begin repairs at the Historic Scott School. On the infrastructure side, we will continue updating and expanding street lighting, planting trees, and improving pedestrian walkways. This fund also pays for new equipment and vehicles which deliver services, such as trucks, fire engines and patrol vehicles.

Our **Water, Sewer and Solid Waste Utility Funds** (21%) are more straightforward. These funds come from fees charged on city utility bills. Our city's aging systems require continual maintenance, repairs and restructuring. Fees are calculated and assessed to customers of a particular service and all fee revenue is reinvested into the specific fund. The City strives to assess the correct level of fees to ensure the various services are well maintained and reliable.

The smallest city budget, the **Insurance Reserve**, of 3%, goes towards allocating costs for liability and property insurance to the various City departments and facilities.

Once adopted by the City Council, I sign for its executive approval and the new budget goes into effect on July 1. This sounds a lot simpler than it is in real life. There are lots of requests from council members and residents, debate over what the role of government is in funding different items, and of course the obligation to balance the budget. It would seem we get to take a vacation after all this work, but typically, we are back the next day at the starting line, gearing up for all the projects and commitments we have made. Another year off to the races - and I am ready!

Notice of Municipal Election

The City of South Salt Lake will hold a Municipal General Election on November 2, 2021 to elect the following:

- Mayor – 4 year term
- City Council Member District 2 – 4 year term
- City Council Member District 3 – 4 year term
- City Council Member District At-Large – 4 year term

To qualify as a candidate a person must be:

1. A United States citizen at the time of filing
2. A legal resident of South Salt Lake for 12 consecutive months immediately preceding the date of the election
3. A registered voter of the municipality
4. A resident of the council district you are filing for
5. Not be a convicted felon unless the right to hold elective office has been restored.
6. Pay the \$25 filing fee.

The City Council has elected to use the Ranked Choice Voting method without a Primary Election.

The candidate filing period is Tuesday, August 10, 2021 through Tuesday, August 17, 2021, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

The candidate filing deadline is Tuesday, August 17, 2021 at 5:00 p.m.

Declaration of Candidacy forms or Nomination Petitions must be filed in person with the City Recorder's Office at 220 East Morris Avenue, Suite 200, South Salt Lake, Utah, unless individuals are subject to Section 20A-9-203(3)(b) of the Utah Code.

Message from SSLFD Chief Terry Addison

After careful consideration, the South Salt Lake Fire Department has determined that due to the current existing hazardous environmental conditions such as low humidity and moisture content of vegetation, fireworks, explosive devices, and open flames create a safety hazard to the community.

Pursuant to South Salt Lake Municipal Code §8.18.090 giving authority to the Fire Chief, during times of adverse fire and hazardous environmental conditions, regarding meteorological conditions, moisture content of plants and soils, and extreme fire danger throughout Utah, in the protection of the health, safety, and welfare of the public; effective immediately and in effect until further notice, fireworks, explosive devices, and open fires are prohibited within the municipal boundaries of the City of South Salt Lake. Residential barbecues are the only exception.

Violations of these restrictions may result in fines and cost recovery of fire-fighting expenses for negligently started fires and may also result in the filing of criminal charges.

The order I brought forward is supported by City Administration and the majority of the City Council via Resolution No. R2021-07 passed on June 23, 2021.

It is the exception for City Officials to take such expansive action. The drought conditions we are experiencing are worse than most of us have seen in our lifetime. 90% of Utah is in an extreme drought. Our reservoirs are visibly lower than prior years and there is no telling how long this drought will last.

As Fire Chief, I am sworn to protect life and property. I am dedicated to ensuring the safety and peace-of-mind of all South Salt Lake residents. For these reasons, I brought forward the Fire Restriction Order to protect the safety of everyone in South Salt Lake. We are asking you to skip personal fireworks this year and make sure everyone can enjoy a safe and fun holiday!

Utah Community Action is consistently an amazing partner, as they support Housing and Case Management, Head Start, and our Adult Education programming. As a dedicated Promise Partner, UCA



worked hard during the pandemic, and to continue to support students and families in South Salt Lake. One service that particularly stands out were the free meals which were provided for the youth (fresh, good food, and including formula and diapers for infants) at our Central Park Head Start location, which is also continuing this summer (see UCA Summer Dinners).

Many parents mentioned how picking up meals was a godsend in assisting them through this time. This message was shared from a family's curbside experience last summer during quarantine, "THANK YOU for doing this, going to pick up meals has become our activity and outing for the day. Detective Neile Hill started at South Salt Lake Police Department in 2009, and has the reputation as the "go-to guy" to get things done.

2021 Community Builder - Lela's Little Free Pantry & Library

Sometime during the year, while passing by Granite Park Jr. High, one of our staff noticed a small white cabinet perched on a post in front of a neighboring home. Marked with the words, "Lela's Little Free Library," she discovered that inside was a selection of several books available for those who want to take them home to read.

Curious about the story behind this free library, we were able to finally meet up with the very busy Stinson family, and discovered that the project was inspired the oldest daughter of their family, now 15 year old Anela (who's nickname is Lela), who since a very young age has always possessed a strong desire to give back. Being a bibliophile, she also began to realize that not all people have access to libraries or can gain a library card (it's harder than you think). Her mom Christina assisted young Lela in building the little library, stocking it with books, either purchased, recycled from their own book collection, or donated by other community members.

While they began this project in 2019, at one point, the library was vandalized and was no longer usable. Then, a kind neighbor took charge and volunteered to repair and repost it so it could be open again for business. In 2020 and due to the increased needs of the community, the family again rethought this little free library as an opportunity to help a little more, and opened up a second free food pantry, with snacks and other food items for anyone, students, neighbors, or any passers by.

"Let your faith be bigger than your fear," became the new theme of Lela's Free "repaired" Little Library. Some people still ask, why would this family spend their time, money and resources on such a thing? As Lela's mom Christina so humbly put, "I see the value in this way of sharing, because I know those who receive really are in need of something here, and that's worth a lot."



QUESTION: How can the City better promote our trails, waterways, and bike paths? What are the best/safest ways to get around SSL?

We agree that the city has some great outdoor recreation and bike routes. We are working on installing direction signs on several of them. The city partners with organizations such as Bike Utah and UDOT Free Bikes for Kids to continue to build bike routes, and make bikes available to residents.

There are many route maps out there, including a new one at sslc.com, which shows current and future routes. Some of these maps are on apps, such as Strava, but may not contain the most up-to-date info. Safety is the city's number one priority for transportation, and you can read the draft of the General Plan for more information on mobility strategies that will carry us into the future.


